
Individualized Education

Academic Excellence

Preparing for Post-High School Opportunities

Students who graduate from KCA are able to obtain Dual-Enrollment credits through Liberty University Online, Regent University, and Virginia Western Community College (VWCC). Through the VWCC Program, students can graduate with a minimum of aquired college credits to a maximum of an Associates Degree, or program certification in areas such as Certified Nursing Assisting and Trade Education.

Students at KCA are offered the opportunity to prepare for college by exploring career options through electives directed at exploring career options and work experience.

Students at KCA are offered Advanced Diploma tracks which allow students to graduate with additional credits and advanced courses. KCA is accredited through several agencies, including ACTS. **Multiple Diploma Tracks**

Standard Diploma Track

Exceeds Virginia Department of Education guidelines by a minimum of 3 credits taught by ACTs certified teachers.

This track requires additional credits in core courses.

Freshman Year

Students should use this year to build good study/organizational skills and work to establish a good GPA. This year will be one that offers the most exploration and students can begin to develop extra-curricular activities and pursue current and emerging interests. Dual enrollment can begin in 9th grade with special consideration.

Sophomore Year

During the sophomore year, students should begin a preliminary college search. This search will include finding colleges with programs of interest, finding requirements for programs, and begin preparing for the skills necessary to complete standardized entry testing. Students can take the PSAT in preparation for the SAT and should continue exploring and adding extra-curriculars during their sophomore year. While it is good to have diversity, if a student is considering a particular, competitive program (such as the fields of medicine or law), having pointed activities (such as volunteering at hospitals or learning CPR) will be important as well. Explore activities within and outside of the school. Begin identifying leaders who may be able to write letters of recommendation. Dual enrollment can begin in 10th grade with special consideration.

Sophmore year: Consider advanced diploma. Consider Dual Enrollment. Research the PSAT/SAT/ACT. Begin a cursory college search/schedule visits for junior year.

Junior Year

The Junior year is often the most rigorous year for high school students. It is important to ensure, this year, that the student knows the diploma track they intend to take and begin planning for classes. It will also be useful to schedule visits to colleges, begin exploring the FASFA (to be completed in fall the year prior to entering college), to schedule and take the SAT and/or ACT (giving time to take multiple times if needed), and to begin applying to colleges. It is critical to maintain academic excellence and extra-curriculars. Students pursuing a skills trade will use this year to begin work-study options to gain experience in chosen fields. It will be important for college-bound juniors to apply to colleges beginning this year. Students will need to begin applying for scholarships and grants just prior to entering their senior year.

Timeline: August-December: Explore colleges/FASFA process/Schedule SAT/ACT. Consider/begin taking Dual Enrollment. Finalize decision regarding Advanced Diploma. March-May: Take SAT/ACT and apply for scholarships.

Senior Year

At this stage, students should complete their FASFA (by Oct. 1), final applications, and ACTs/SATs in the fall. This year will be one of decision regarding college and career. It is important not to drop academic rigor, but to maintain high quality, excellent work. Students should continue applying for scholarships, particularly school and degree-specific scholarships as these are identified.

Timeline: Finalize school applications, FASFA, and take the SAT/ACT in early fall. Students will begin selecting college options in the early Spring.
